

Our Expectation



- In the MFL department, we follow these basic rules which make learning productive for you and teaching effective for the teachers:

Before the lesson starts:

- 1 Be on time—every minute lost will impact on how much we get done in that lesson.
- 2 Enter quietly!
- 3 Stand swiftly behind your chair without fuss.
- 4 Wait for the greeting and then sit down silently—ready to start.
- 5 Ensure you have your homework ready and complete.



During a lesson:

- 1 You will have many opportunities to speak in language lessons, such is the nature of the subject.
- 2 Volunteer answers—don't wait to be called up.
- 3 Use clues around the room (posters, displays, etc.) to help you work out answers.
- 4 Work hard to do your best—use the grade descriptors available to you to work out what you need to do to achieve the next grade up!
- 5 Finally, enjoy your lessons!



At the end of a lesson:

- 1 Make sure you tidy your things away when the teacher tells you.
- 2 Tuck your chair in and stand quietly behind your chair.
- 3 Wait to be dismissed by the teacher.



To Parents: Unnecessary equipment

“Don’t know this word? I’ll just look it up on my phone...”


This has become a well-used one-liner amongst young people nowadays.

However easy it might be, it deprives them of essential skills such as using dictionaries to look up words, researching for themselves and using contextual information to find out the meaning of words.

The use of phones in class would also allow your children to disengage from lessons as taking a simple mobile photo of the whiteboard at the end of the lesson appeals a lot more than making their own notes.

Through this, though, they are not actively engaging with the lesson content and are merely passively “letting it happen”.

Therefore: Please talk to your son or daughter about how the use of their mobile phones or any other online device is not permitted in their language classes, unless instructed by the teacher.



And finally....

What previous Year 7 pupils said after their first year:



"I really like learning German. It is my favourite subject. I love learning the language but also about other cultures."

"Learning languages is quite different to what I thought it would be:

We are learning so much more than just words. We are learning how to learn them and the links to other subjects. That's the bit that interests me."



"I love French and can't wait to go to France soon. I would really like to test how much I can say from what I have learnt in lessons."

"Learning French has helped me understand the world a little bit better. There is so much more than just English. But many words sound similar to English. This makes it easy to learn."

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
